From empires to nations (the international context of the Language Brotherhoods)

Santiago de Compostela, Council of Galician Culture, October 6-7, 2016

The conference, organised and sponsored by the Council of Galician Culture (www.consellodacultura.gal), a member institution of NISE (www.nise.eu), aims at commemorating the centenary of the emergence of the Language Brotherhoods (Irmandades da Fala), the first Galician nationalist organisation which marked the beginning of the national stage in the history of the Galician movement. A special emphasis will be put on the international context, by placing the Galician case within a larger framework, in order to understand how and why "nationalism" spread throughout (and outside) the European continent during the years of WWI, a dimension of the conflict which has been obscured so far in the many conferences held on the occasion of the centenary of the Great War.

Working languages will be Galician and English. Simultaneous translation will be provided. A joint publication of the papers by an international publisher with NISE's participation will be envisaged.
